Every month, public health and healthcare professionals highlight national health observances (NHOs) to raise awareness about important health topics and to encourage individuals and communities to stay health.

The month of October highlights several NHOs such as health literacy, breast cancer, domestic violence, and mental health awareness.

## **Breast Cancer**

#### Awareness

The KY Cancer Registry says 1 in 8 women in Kentucky will be diagnosed with breast cancer during her lifetime. In 2021, an estimated 4,600 women received a breast cancer diagnosis. Current recommendations encourage women between the ages of 40-74 should have a mammogram ever 2 years. If you have a higher risk of breast cancer, your doctor may recommend starting mammograms at an earlier age. Finding breast cancer early is key to successful treatment! Talk to your doctor to find out what is best for you.

### Domestic Violence Month

According to the 2023 Kentucky domestic violence report, 1 in 2 women and 1 in 3 men have experienced domestic violence. However, national data suggests that only about 54% of domestic violence incidents are reported. This October take the time to share the domestic violence hotline!

# Upcoming in Reportable Disease

## 2024-2025 Respiratory Outbreak Reporting

Outbreaks of respiratory illnesses such as Covid-19, Influenza, or RSV in various setting should be reported to the local health department and the Kentucky Department for Public Health.

#### **Long-term Care Facilities:**

An outbreak is defined as two (2) or more cases of the same respiratory illness occurring within 72 hours of each other in patients and/or staff. Outbreaks will be closed after two (2) incubation periods (which equals one (1) week) have passed without any new cases in patients and/or staff. For any questions about this, reach out to the local health department or regional epidemiologist.

Childcare Facilities: An outbreak of Covid-19, Influenza, or RSV occurring in childcare settings is defined as three (3) or more cases of the same illness within 72 hours identified in the same area of the building in children and/or staff (not including samehousehold contacts). For any questions about reporting childcare facility outbreaks, reach out to the local health department or regional epidemiologist.

In addition to long-term care and childcare facilities, outbreaks should be reported if there is an unexpected increase in mortality in any population and/or unexpected rates of severe illness/hospitalization in specific vulnerable populations.

Since KDPH is no longer tracking individual cases of Covid-19, schools are not required to track and/or report Covid-19 cases.

When notifying one of the designated individuals about an outbreak, it's important to provide detailed information about the situation. This includes the nature of the outbreak, the number of sick individuals, and any immediate measures already taken. After reporting, the individual will initiate the necessary collaboration with the other parties involved to ensure a coordinated response. The facility will receive timely follow-up to manage the outbreak effectively and to prevent further spread. This streamlined communication helps in maintaining a clear and efficient response protocol, ensuring that all relevant parties are informed and that the necessary actions are implemented properly.
